Whether you participate in horse shows, racing, eventing, trail riding or any other equestrian pursuit, I encourage you to have CPR and First Aid training. As a former Emergency Medical Technician and American Red Cross Instructor-Trainer in CPR/AED and First Aid I always carry First Aid supplies in my vehicle and on the trail. Last Saturday, while leading a trail ride on the DEC West Almond Trails, one of the horses kicked at another with sharp hooves landing square on a rider's leg. When I looked behind to see what the commotion was all about, I saw blood through blue jeans, which was enough for me to activate 911. But...we had no cell service, so I climbed down from my horse and reached into my first aid kit while others were getting the rider off his horse and on the ground. Assessing the injury, I had some thick bleeding control types of pads and gauze wrap. Thankfully, bones were not broken and there was no arterial bleeding. We were able to get the rider back to the camping area, where his wife drove him to the Emergency Room miles away to receive 12 sutures to close the deep, gaping wound.

A couple of riders normally carry first aid supplies but did not have them that day. The DEC Ranger was not available to respond. I sent two riders out to get to a spot where they did have cell service and call 911, but as a team, not alone. Just a reminder, if you don't have first aid training, please get it. If you don't have a first aid kit to take with you on the horse, please make one. If you are going out with friends on a trail ride and other riders show up, trade emergency contact information.

Enjoy this glorious fall weather, be safe, and Happy Trails! I'll see you at Brookfield or Cornell!

Begin Again Horse Rescue Jennifer Lilly

There have been some very exciting developments lately at Begin Again Horse Rescue In Lima, NY! It all began a few months ago with the donation of a farmette in Perry, NY, by the family of the late equestrienne, Dinah Hoyt Taylor. The property was listed and sold, which enabled us to begin building a barn to honor her memory. The new barn will include eight 12x12 box stalls, a wash stall, rest room and feed room. The stalls will be removed from the pre-existing indoor arena, allowing training to resume under cover. Construction has begun and we are looking forward to a barn providing the equines and staff of Begin Again an improved facility!



On September 9th Begin Again Horse Rescue hosted the 3rd Annual Charity Challenge Obstacle Competition at the Hemlock Fairgrounds. 62 entries braved the rainy conditions to round out an absolutely wonderful day of horsemanship and great experiences for all. Under the expert guidance of judge, Bonnie Hayne, horses from Miniatures to Draft crosses negotiated an arena of 12 tests of skill and desensitization both ridden and in hand. Special awards were given to Judy Fuller Brown/Tennessee Wind Chimer for the Highest Combined Age, Alexandria Howe/Milo for Best Dressed, and Aimee Shultz/Skip To My Lulu for the Highest Scoring Rescue Horse. Everyone agreed they are looking forward to coming back in 2024!

Signs of Abuse

Neglect and abuse of horses is a big issue in the world today. Often neglect is not intentil, but comes out of ignorance, loss of interest, or personal crisis. These are not excuses for the neglect and should be remedied. Horses found in questionable situations are investigated by local law enforcement officials and cruelty investigators. If the case is indeed neglect and/or abuse, we may be asked to assist by officials, in which case the horse may be removed and brought to us. After receiving a veterinary

evaluation, the horse will start rehabilitation and, hopefully, get back on the road to health and happiness.

Please notify your local Humane Society, SPCA and local law enforcement if you are questioning the condition of any animal. You may contact us for more information. Horse abuse and neglect can occur anywhere, from any backyard pasture, to a private or public boarding stable. Besides the obvious (no food, water, or shelter), the following are some additional signs of abuse and neglect:

- Unusually thin (spine and hips protruding)
- Lack of condition dull coat & glassy eyes
- Untended and overgrown hooves
- Lethargic manner
- Limping (any form of lameness) or extreme stiffness
- Reluctant to move from a "sawhorse" stance (front legs extended)
- Unusual discharge from nose, mouth, eyes, or wound
- Weakness or distress
- Cuts & whip marks
- Spur marks
- Tack sores
- Extreme fear, depression and distrust
- Unattended wounds/injuries that are infected, ulcerated, or oozing

Alfred University Equine Business Management Degree Takes Off with NYS Approval



Equestrian studies now come with the option of a BS in Equine Business Management The New York State Education Department this week granted its approval of Alfred University's new major in Equine Business Management, offered through the University's College of Business. Mark Lewis, Dean of the College of Business, said he is "very enthusiastic" about students whom the Business College will serve through the new program.

Alfred University undergraduates may begin declaring a major in Equine Business Management effective for the Fall semester of 2023. They anticipate between five and ten students in the major in Fall 2023, with new students entering every year right out of high school.

According to Steve Shank, Director of the Equestrian Program, future employment prospects for EBM majors include working in the horseracing sector; managing brood mare and equestrian programs/facilities; equestrian therapy; rescue and sanctuary management; and teaching in equine academic institutions.

New Committee Formed Equine Emergency Fund (Benevolence Committee) Colleen Segarra, Chair`

- Who do we want to help for now, just horses, with direct payments to vendors, initial \$100 at discretion of chair for urgent/immediate needs, \$500 cap per situation. Eventually could open up to more. Most emergencies are also assisted by local community, go fund me and other local agencies, we would most likely not be the sole source of support, but we can be the first responders once funding is in place.
- 2. What do we want to provide emergency funding for necessities such as hay, grain, emergency veterinary, emergency transport, etc. Each case will be considered separately.
- 3. Insurance seldom covers all expenses. What are things are not normally covered by insurance? Colleen will check with her Farm Family agent to see what is normally covered in event of loss.
- 4. What will be the criteria i.e. must already be a NYSHC membership. Need to come up with ideas for criteria. What are the terms of what the NYSHC is willing to do. The local chapters should be the front line to oversee the expenditure.
- 5. Funding tshirt sales, state level events in 2024, solicit donations, apply for grants, some equine organizations have grants we can apply for, solicit at chapter events, ask chapters with events and clinics if they would donate a portion from a voluntary check off. Can be deducted from fee, or can be a voluntary donation by participant. Ask chapters to put out donation jars at events. Possible partner with Tractor Supply for donations or discounts; Colleen will inquire with regional manager. Members get first priority; based on available resources we can consider other requests later. Funds will be kept as a separate line item by Steve when doing accounting, Colleen will reach out to him. He may also have a sample thank you letter. The committee will handle thank you letters. Lissette could have her secretary handle sending thank you letters.
- 6. Solicitation letter template Lisette will do first draft, committee will give input, and committee will handle personalized thank you letters. Application – emergency expenditures can be made on a discretionary basis, if expenses are not approved, owners will reimburse the nyshc. Parties agree that these are expenses that are not covered by insurance, should insurance cover any portion of the expenses. Find out if they have an insurance policy; if we pay for a covered expense, we would expect reimbursement. Up to \$500, provide proof of receipts. Sometimes local feed stores will help with donations.
- 7. Colleen will draft an application for committee review. Applications considered on a case by case basis. Authorize committee chair to expend up to \$100 and have a majority vote on applications. If cases are misrepresented and do not qualify, reimbursement will be required.
- 8. Send an email blast to all members when there is an emergency, let them know there is an Equine Emergency Fund.
